We asked Mrs G

What is the biggest change you've seen in education?

Many changes. One thing that really stands out today from when I started is the impact of AI. It was almost non-existent then and I remember having to use the obsolete OHP – overhead projector to teach.

I spent a lot of time writing my teaching notes on the plastic sheets and then flashing them in the classroom.

So for me, the one big change is the shift to technology and the various AI tools to support teachers today. Teachers today are very lucky to have so many tools to explore and facilitate their teaching. As for the students, they will ride with the wave of technology too but I think something that is timeless about them is the energy they give off in school. No matter which school and through the years, I see that they are bursting with energy – sometimes in the wrong direction but mostly it is good.

What is most meaningful to you when you reconnect with the many generations of Springfield students years after they have graduated?

I would not say many generations and whether they have gone to do amazing things but I feel a sense of gratification when I suddenly bump into my ex-students years later and they stop to say hello and then comes the dreaded question – do you remember my name. But they are very forgiving when most of the time I say I do not and seek their forgiveness. Then we go on to share some memories of school life years before.

But overall, I feel a sense of pride when I hear their success stories and how their lives have changed post-secondary. They usually share positive tales of when they were in SFSS and the many teachers and friends whose lives they encountered. This also brings back memories for me and we end up reminiscing about the good old days.

The Springfield Foundation: Lessons in Leadership

For Hashini, leadership at Springfield Secondary was never about a title; it was about people. "Springfield taught me that real influence stems from empathy and listening, not just authority," she reflects. "It's about understanding others deeply and creating a space where everyone has the opportunity to grow alongside you." One of her proudest legacies as Vice-President was the inauguration of Friendship Week as a school-wide celebration. For Hashini, this project served as a powerful reminder of how small, sincere ideas can cultivate a profound sense of belonging within a community.

Defining Memories

When asked what she misses most, Hashini points to the "shared pressure and joy" that defined her four years. From quiet study sessions in the library and lighthearted consultations with teachers to the spirited competition of Spring Forth, the memories are vivid. "Forming our own Student Council band for Teachers' Day is a moment I hold especially close," she shares. "Those moments of togetherness truly define the Springfield experience for me."

Discovery of Passion

Mr Cher graduated from Springfield Secondary School in 2011 before pursuing a Diploma in Interactive Media and Informatics at Temasek Polytechnic. He later completed a part-time Bachelor of Social Work in Singapore University of Social Sciences which led him into the social service sector and school social work.

Day in Day Out

He currently works as a school social worker in Metta School, a special education school, with a focus on youths between 17 – 21 years of age. He finds meaning in his work as he provides counselling to students who face emotional, behavioural, social or family-related challenges. In addition, he works with stakeholders such as teachers, allied health professionals, and external agencies to ensure a more holistic support system for students.

Dispositions and Skillsets needed

If you are interested to pursue a future in Social Work, Mr Cher shares that key dispositions needed include empathy, patience, resilience, adaptability, good communication, and the ability to stay calm under pressure. It is also important to remain non-judgmental and work as a team with the various stakeholders.

Beliefs that Ground him

He believes that children and adults are our future, and therefore they need to be nurtured and supported. This grounds him in his work, even on days when it can be challenging.

At times, difficult decisions have to be made depending on circumstances. However, Mr Cher finds his work rewarding as he sees the impact of small but meaningful impact over time. He notes that the progress of each student is now always linear, but they have grown to move towards meaningful lives and are contributing positively to their families and society.
